This Heritage Trail Concept Plan outlines conceptual interpretive and design approaches for the possible historic resources of Whitman County, Washington and Latah County, Idaho.




These structures trace the history of the development of the flat lands of the Palouse along with the railroads themselves. Ironically too, they may point to a future where rail transportation is once again vital.


Ultimately, the Heritage Trail should link, via rail to trails and roadways, all significant structures in Whitman and Latah Counties.




Rail Roads in the Region (Need better map)

The following pages focus only on the core area of Pullman.











These existing buildings in Pullman's core should be studied and preserved.
